COVID-19 Activity Increases as Prevalence of JN.1 Variant Continues to Rise

As we enter the new year, there is a new variant of <u>SARS-CoV-2 called JN.1</u> that is being tracked by the CDC across the United States. JN.1 is the offspring of BA.2.86, and it's not only circulating in the US but also globally. The CDC is closely monitoring the increase in JN.1 in both international travelers and wastewater viral levels. The CDC provides weekly updates on respiratory viruses, and if you want to stay up to date with the latest information, visit the <u>CDC Respiratory Virus Updates</u>.

<u>Anyone ages 6 months and up can get an updated vaccine</u>, regardless of previous vaccination status. Most people only need a single dose of the updated 2023-24 vaccine.<u>Stay up to date withCovid-19</u> vaccination updates:

What Parents Should Know about Vaccinations:

- Everyone aged **5 years and older** should get 1 dose of an updated COVID-19 vaccine to protect against serious illness from COVID-19.
- Children aged **6 months-4 years old** need multiple doses of <u>COVID-19 vaccines</u> need to be up to date, including at least 1 dose of updated COVID -19 vaccine.

3-1-1

Did you know 3-1-1 connects the citizens of Baltimore with the latest city services, programs, and information? 3-1-1 allows city residents to report a concern or request a city service. Either by a live agent-assisted phone call or through the self-service web or mobile portal, 311 allows customers to report a problem, request a service, check the status of a previously submitted service request, and <u>obtain information regarding City programs or events</u>.



The Mayor's Office of Homeless Services

The Mayor's Office of Homeless Services (MOHS) is dedicated to reducing homelessness in Baltimore City by making it rare, brief, and non-recurring. They aim to provide safe and sustainable housing for all residents of Baltimore. MOHS offers programs that help people experiencing or at risk of homelessness navigate the housing process and access essential resources. One of these resources is an <u>interactive</u> tool that provides the locations of homeless services within Baltimore City.

The Baltimore New American Access Coalition-Advancing with Resources

The Baltimore New American Access Coalition (BNAAC) is a group of community organizations [CASA, Esperanza Center, Southeast CDC, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS)], led by MIMA, who are offering public benefit navigation to New American families. Eligible clients can receive help with applying for public benefits, including, health care coverage, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), WIC, cash assistance (TCA), childcare, home energy assistance, Affordable Connectivity Program/internet resources, and more. In 2023 the BNAAC program enrolled 447 clients from 23 different Baltimore City zip codes. Benefit Navigators aided in filling out 1000 public benefit applications. The program is currently providing benefit navigation support in over 10 languages.

DHS Helps to Hold Exploitative Employers Accountable The <u>Department of Homeland Security (DHS</u>) has issued new guidelines for noncitizen workers to never be afraid to report employer exploitation through the appropriate channels. This will safeguard the workers' interests when there is a labor agency investigation or enforcement action that is ongoing. Noncitizens can submit such requests to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services



(USCIS) through a dedicated central intake point designed to facilitate labor agency investigative and enforcement efforts.Learn about the process for workers and labor agencies.
